From the Bridge Priest

"But I am like a green olive tree in the house of God. I trust in the steadfast love of God forever and ever." - Psalm 52:8

Dear Ones of Grace,

Autumn here in the northern hemisphere is a visible season of transition in the natural world. Our changing trees, the changing light, our changing schedules—the signs of beginnings and endings are all around us. We have been and are, of course, in a season of transition, search, and discernment at Grace. Your search and discernment committee, your officers and vestry, will be sharing news of their work with you this season, as together you all anticipate the call of a new rector to minister alongside you—how exciting this is!

During these next months of clergy leadership transition and beyond, Grace Church will call on you for your support. Grace needs your prayers, your presence, your listening ears and hearts, your voices, and your generous and courageous stewardship and sharing of your time, talent, and treasure, including in new ways you may not have

considered before. Together, you have an abundance of God-given gifts to share—in fact, Grace's stewardship theme for this year is "Rooted in Abundance." During this autumn of change, not just at Grace but in our wider Church and world, our rootedness in God and in God's abundance feels more essential than ever.

The psalm verse above is one of my favorites, one that I have prayed often in times of challenge and change. When I went to the Holy Land on pilgrimage, I fell in love with olive trees. We saw some very old and very beautiful gnarled olive trees there. As they age, they put out new shoots and branches, continuing to bear fruit through ideal and challenging conditions alike. When I pray verse 8 of Psalm 52 I pray to be like those trees, to root myself in God's abundant and steadfast love. I pray that you all will find rootedness and nourishment there, too, in this season of change and exciting possibility.

I continue to gratefully experience the many ways God's love bears fruit through each and all of you at Grace. It has been a gift to travel with you these 3+ years, as your bridge priest during this year of change, and as your curate before that. The time of our goodbye is approaching and is still unknown—it will depend on the timing of Grace's search and of my own search. This fall, during our remaining time together, I bid your prayers as I continue to engage in my own discernment around where God is calling me to serve next. And my prayers are and will be with you, also.

As we approach the other side of our bridge, I'll end with an encore of something I wrote in the November/December 2022 issue of

I pray that we might enjoy the view from the bridge, and the journey as we make it, remembering that the Holy Spirit is with us, upholding and inspiring us in our discernments. September-October

We begin September with the last Sunday in our Summer Cycle with the Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost. There will be a **baptism** at the Sunday 9am service on September 3. Starting the following weekend, September 9-10, we begin the **Program Year** with the traditional Homecoming Weekend. It is a continuation of the Season of Pentecost, and the liturgical color remains Green. We will be using Prayers of the People form III, and, with some exceptions, Eucharistic Prayer from Enriching Our Worship. The Saturday service remains at 5pm in All Saints' Chapel, and the Sunday service starts at 10am. The choir will return, and we will be going back to Eucharist at the High Altar. After the service there will be a **Homecoming Brunch** where heads of the various ministries will be present ready with information about their ministries, encouraging members and new members who may wish to volunteer to join one of the many ministries available to our laity.

The next weekend, September 16-17 is the Sixteenth after Pentecost. The 10am Sunday Eucharist will incorporate the Children's Liturgy, Teachers, students, and their backpacks will be blessed at this service. The following weekend, September 23-24. The Seventeenth after Pentecost will begin the yearly Pledge Campaign. Then comes the Eighteenth after Pentecost September 30-October 1 with regular services.

The following weekend, October 7-8, is one of our most loved traditions, we will celebrate the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, whose day is October 4. The Altar is decorated with stuffed animals instead of flowers, and everyone is invited to bring their, furry, finned, and feathered friends to the Eucharist for a Blessing. October 14-15, the Twentieth after Pentecost, there will be regular services. October 21-22 will be **Pledge Ingathering**. October 28-29 is Acolyte Sunday when all our Lay Ministers will be honored and new Lay Ministers commissioned at the 10am Service. Following the service, the annual Putting the Garden to Sleep Event will occur.

Martha's Pantry Update

Hello Grace Church Family!

Martha's Pantry recently submitted our annual survey report to the Greater Boston Food Bank (GBFB). The GBFB is our main source of food for the guests who visit Martha's Pantry once a month. We would like to take the opportunity to share some of the data from this report with our Grace Church Family.

Over the course of the last year, from July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023, Martha's Pantry served 2,615 families for a total of 11,279 individuals!

Specific Age Category Data: Children-(under the age of 18)-4,415 Adults-(between the ages of 19 and 65)-5,724 Seniors-(over the age of 65)-1,140

Given we are open only two hours per week (Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:30am-10:30am), we are incredibly blessed by the number of people in our community who we can help with this wonderful Grace Church Outreach Ministry.

The following is more detailed information about the Food Pantry process:

Not including the donations received from our Grace Church Family and some local garden resources, over the course of one year we have received 161,278 pounds of food from the GBFB. Even though that seems like a "Ton" of food (80+ Tons to be exact!), we often run out of stock items very quickly. We try to offer a variety of healthy fresh food like vegetables, fruits, produce, eggs, milk, yogurt, and other staples. Historically, we did not have the cold storage capacity necessary to allow us to bring in more of these healthy fresh food items. That is, until very recently! We are very pleased to announce the addition of a walk-in cooler funded by a grant and other private charitable donations received for Martha's Food Pantry. The new

cooler will afford us more refrigeration space and the ability to procure more fresh food. In addition to fresh food, we also distribute shelf stable items like canned soups, vegetables, rice, cereal, beans, pasta, sauces, tuna, chili, juices, milk and the like. Donations are very important to Martha's Pantry! With that said, hearty soups are always in demand, along with meal extenders like tuna and hamburger helper, ramen noodles, etc. Past contributions and donations really have made a tremendous difference!

Martha's Pantry guidelines for the guests are simple and consistent. We allow guests to visit Martha's Pantry once per month. At a minimum we provide three days of three full meals for each person in the household. Although this may not seem like a lot of food, it is greatly appreciated by our guests and their families. Many of our guests have been coming to Martha's Pantry for years and we have come to know them by name. Martha's Pantry had humble beginnings started by a core group of volunteers and magnificent parishioner Martha Reed. Their mission, which endures today, was to help people in need and share some of the bounty of the Grace Church Family. The Pantry has now been in operation for more than 20 years and although the venue and format has changed, our outreach ministry remains strong with a core group of dedicated volunteers. Our volunteers help off-load the shipments from GBFB every 2nd and 4th Tuesday of each month as well as work the actual Pantry on Wednesdays and Fridays. We also have volunteers who come in during the week to prepackage the shelf stable food. It can be hard work and often hectic, but it is a joyful place where friends are made and it is always rewarding. There is always a need for new

volunteers.

We appreciate your continued support of the blessing we call Martha's Pantry through your donations of food and/or consideration of your time as a volunteer. Be well.
